Hank Tenorio "Keep Kids Out of the Rough" Golf Tournament

HENRY "HANK" DELGADO TENORIO (1937 - 2001)

The tournament was first created by Hank Tenorio and NLPDA Founder, Vicente Calderon. Since Hank's passing in 2001, the NLPDA continues to host the event in his honor. Hank was a retired Federal Bureau of Investigations agent, inspirational colleague, leader, mentor, friend, and family member, who tirelessly gave back to the community.

Henry Delgado Tenorio was born on July 15, 1937 in Torrington, Wyoming, where his family had been harvesting sugar beet crops. Henry figured the odds were against him. A college education? A career in the FBI? Not when his parents had to scrape for every dollar, sometimes as migrant farm workers, to raise 13 children. His parents moved their family to Amarillo, Texas, where they operated various businesses, including a restaurant and a pool hall. Henry's academic achievement and skills as a high school fullback in Amarillo led to a college scholarship to Benedictine College in Atchison, Kansas. He was the first in his family to go to college. He was off and running.

Henry was an FBI agent who helped pave the way for fellow Hispanics and minorities in the agency. Henry was a graduate of Benedictine College (B.S.) and the University of Texas at El Paso (M.A.). He joined the FBI in 1970. Two years later, he was transferred to the San Diego office where he specialized in kidnappings, anti-terrorism, bank robberies, and hostage/crisis management. When he retired in 1994, he was the highest ranking Hispanic undercover agent in the FBI's San Diego office. By then, he had become a mentor to several agents, including Ruben Garcia, who became Assistant Director of the FBI's Criminal Division in Washington, D.C. "Henry was one of those individuals who takes you under his wing and shows you the ropes," Garcia said. "He was a tremendous people person. He recognized that you have to establish rapport with the general public, and he loved that." As a bilingual Special Agent, Henry often investigated kidnappings on both sides of the border. He became a liaison between the San Diego office and law enforcement agencies in Tijuana and Ensenada. This led to solving cases that would have been more difficult without his involvement, according to Aaron Sanchez, a former FBI colleague. "Henry loved his job so much that he often said he hadn't worked a day in his life," Sanchez said. Even in retirement, he worked up to 40 hours a week as a consultant for law enforcement agencies.

Henry's other passions were golf and community service. During his FBI career, he won several Police Olympic golf tournaments in California and Nevada and at one time maintained a two-handicap. Later, as a security consultant to the PGA Tour, he befriended such pro's as Lee Trevino and Chi Chi Rodriguez, once serving as a caddie for the latter. He operated the Dos Amigos Foundation, which Mr. Rodriguez founded to raise funds for underprivileged children and orphanages in Mexico. He organized a golf tournament in October, 2001 to benefit children of FBI agents who had died in the line of duty. Before his death, Mr. Tenorio had been planning a golf event in December in Escondido to benefit families of victims of the 9/11 terrorist attacks. He died on November 9, 2001, at age of 64.
